# Demographics

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### 1.1 Population Estimates and Projections

Leon County's population increased by 36,035 residents between the 2000 and 2010 Census. More than 85% of the population growth in Leon County between 2000 and 2010 occurred within the City of Tallahassee while 15% of the growth was in Unincorporated Leon County. In comparison, between 1990 and 2000, 45% of the population growth occurred in Unincorporated Leon County.

#### 1.5 Components of Population Change

The components of population change in Leon County in the last decade (2000-2010) changed considerably in comparison with the 1990-2000 time period. The percentage of Leon County's population growth associated with net migration dropped from 67.1% in 2000 to 56.1% in 2010. It is estimated that since the 2010 Census, all of Leon County's population growth is attributable to net natural increase (total births less total deaths). Net migration is estimated to have been negative during the period indicating more people moved out of Leon County than moved into Leon County.

#### 1.7 Household Characteristics

#### 1.8 Educational Attainment

The level of educational attainment in Leon County increased between 2000 and 2010. In 2010, 9.4% of the population 25 years and over had not received a high school diploma, down from 9.9% in 2000. In comparison, 41.3% of Leon County residents 25 years and over had obtained a Bachelor's degree or higher compared with 27.9% for the nation and 25.9% for the state.


#### 2.2 Unemployment

The unemployment rate in Leon County decreased to 7.2% in 2012, still considerably lower than the state average of 8.6%. Initial claims for unemployment compensation decreased 15.7% in 2012 in Leon County and 15.3% for the State.

#### 2.3 Employment by Industry


Between 2007 and 2012, non-agricultural employment in Leon County decreased on average 1.3% per year. Education & Health Services exhibited the strongest growth (up 2.2% per year). Leisure & Hospitality and Federal Government exhibited small annual average gains while all other industries experienced declining average annual employment during the period.

#### 2.9 Per Capita Personal Income



#### Section 3

## **Economic Factors**

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#### 3.1 Taxable Sales

Taxable sales data for various Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA's) are popularly used as one indicator of regional economic activity. These data come to the state on sales tax returns filed monthl by retail establishments with the Florida Department of Revenue. The overall level of taxable sales increased 2.9% in the Tallahassee MSA in 2012. Taxable sales for the State of Florida were up 6.1% i 2012 compared with 2011. By category, the two categories in the Tallahassee MSA that saw the greatest increase in taxable sales between 2011 and 2012 were Autos and Accessories, 10.3% and Building Investment, 5.3%. Two categories saw a decrease in taxable sales between 2011 and 2012: Business Investment, 2.0% and Consumer Durables, 1.8%. It is estimated that taxable sales compris 40-45% of all retail sales.





#### 3.3 Annual Visitor Trends

In calendar year 2012, more than 2.4 million people (person visits) visited Leon County, down 5.2% from calendar year 2011 levels. Visitor spending totaled \$623.6 million in 2012, 8.1% higher than total non-inflation adjusted visitor spending in 2011.




#### 3.4 Florida Price Level Index

The Florida Price Level Index (FPLI) was established by the Legislature as the basis for the District Cost Differential (DCD) in the Florida Education Finance Program. In this role, the FPLI is used to represent the costs of hiring equally qualified personnel across school districts. Note that this is a cross-sectional measure that compares the relative wage levels among Florida's 67 counties and is not designed to measure inflation from one year to the next.

### 3.5 Gross Domestic Product by Metro. Area

In 2011, the Tallahassee Metropolitan Area's (MSA) gross domestic product was \$13.5 billion, up \$0.3 billion from 2010. Real GDP in metropolitan area increased 1.6% in 2011 after increasing 3.1% in 2010. Real GDP increased in 242 of the nation's 366 metropolitan areas in 2011 led by growth in professional and business services, durable-goods manufacturing and trade.





#### Section 5

# **Community and Environment**

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### 5.1 History of Tallahassee/Leon County

Leon County, originally part of Escambia County and later a part of Gadsden County, was created by the Territorial Legislature in 1824. Named for Ponce De Leon, Leon County was one of the most populous and prosperous counties in ante-bellum Florida.

Tallahassee, named for the "old fields" that it once encompassed, earned the title early in the 16th century from the Apalachee Indians who inhabited the area. Legend says that the final spelling was chosen by Octavia Walton, daughter of the territorial governor of Florida. Today, Tallahassee exemplifies not only the influence of the Indian, but also that of the Spanish, French and English who occupied the area in succession.

The City of Tallahassee, the county seat and only incorporated city in Leon County, was established in 1825, following a decision by the legislature to locate the capital of the new Florida Territory midway between the population centers of St. Augustine and Pensacola.

The following outline represents a brief historical sketch of the area:

- **500-1528** Apalachee Indians flourish in the area, settling into villages and displaying a flair for agriculture, trading and pottery.
- **1528** An expedition under Panfilo de Narvaez become the first Europeans to come into contact with the local Indians.
- **1539** The Hernando de Soto expedition winters in an area that is within one mile of the present Capitol building and celebrates the first Christmas in Tallahassee.
- **1528-1607** Contact with Spanish invaders decimates the Apalachee population through disease and warfare.
- **1607** Apalachee Indians ask the Spanish Governor to send missionaries into the area.
- **1633** The Spanish establish a mission chain from St. Augustine to Tallahassee (Fort San Luis).
- **1704** Spanish missions are destroyed by combined Creek Indians and British forces; Apalachee Indians leave the area.
- **1725** Creek Indians enter the area from Georgia and Alabama. These and other Indians in the area later become known as Seminoles (runaways).
- **1763** The Tallahassee area becomes a British possession when Spain cedes Florida to England in exchange for Cuba.
- 1783 Spain regains possession of Florida.
- **1818** General Andrew Jackson invades Florida and drives the Seminole Indians from Leon County.
- **1819** Florida is ceded by Spain to the United States.
- **1822** The Territory of Florida is created by an act of Congress.

### 5.2 Tallahassee's History of Annexations

The City of Tallahassee has had a long history of annexation activity as a means of achieving growth. During its first 150 years, Tallahassee expanded from one-quarter of a mile in size to 28.18 square miles by 1980. Since 1980, the City has witnessed a tremendous increase in annexation activity with 75 additional square miles having been added during this time, swelling the size of Tallahassee to 103.25 square miles as of January 1, 2013. Many of the annexations in the early 1980's were accomplished through a double-referendum process that required the approval of City voters. Since 1985 the vast majority of the City's annexations have been achieved through a voluntary process where the owners of properties petition for inclusion into the City.

## 5.1 History of Tallahassee/Leon County

- **1824** Leon County is created by the Territorial Legislature with Tallahassee as the County seat and State Capital. The first land survey of the area is made. The City of Tallahassee was incorporated the following year.
- **1834** The Tallahassee-St. Marks railroad is constructed (reported to be the third oldest railroad in the United States).
- 1845 Florida becomes the 27th State.
- **1853** The West Florida Seminary is established; it later becomes the Florida State College for Women; today it is the Florida State University.
- 1861 Florida secedes from the Union.
- **1865** Federal troops are repelled at the battle of Natural Bridge in southeast Leon County, leaving Tallahassee as the only Confederate capital east of the Mississippi River not captured during the Civil War.
- **1887** The Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University is established.
- **1919** The Legislature passes a new city charter for Tallahassee, authorizing a Commission-Manager form of government.
- **1931** The Lively Vocational Technical School is established.
- **1966** The Tallahassee Community College is established.
- **1997** Tallahassee citizens select their first directly-elected Mayor since 1919, replacing the system of yearly rotation among the City Commissioners.
- **2002** The citizens of Leon County voted to make Leon County a Home Rule Charter County. The charter provides citizens more direct participation in county government.

### 5.3 Climate

Tallahassee has a mild, moist climate characteristic of the Gulf States, experiencing a subtropical summer similar to the rest of Florida. In contrast to the Florida peninsula, Northwest Florida of which Tallahassee is a part, experiences four seasons. Prevailing winds average 6.2 miles per hour and are from a southerly direction in the spring and summer, then shift toward a more northerly direction later in the year.

## 5.4 Public Safety


Between 2011 and 2012, Leon County experienced a 7.8% decrease in the total crime index rate (rate per 100,000 population) compared to a 6.5% decrease for the State of Florida. The index rate for violent crimes in Leon County decreased 8.3% in 2012 over 2011 levels. Property Crime rates decreased 7.7% between 2011 and 2012 with the rate of burglaries down 17.3% during the period and a 30.7% increase in the rate of motor vehicle thefts.

#### 5.5 Local Government

Since 1919 the City of Tallahassee has operated under a Commission-Manager form of government. The Mayor and four Commissioners are elected at-large for staggered four-year terms with elections for two commission seats being held every other year. The City Commission appoints four officers to administer the duties of the city: City Manager, City Treasurer-Clerk, City Auditor, and City Attorney. The County is guided by an elected seven-member Board of County Commissioners, five of whom are elected to serve specific commission districts and two members are elected at-large. Each Commissioner is elected to a four-year term with the position of Chairperson selected annually on a rotating basis. The County Administrator is appointed by the Board to oversee all functions, directives and policies. The County Administrator administers all county offices not governed by elected County officials. Elected County officials include the Sheriff, Property Appraiser, Clerk of the Court, Supervisor of Elections and Tax Collector.

# **Residential and Commercial Development**

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### 6.1 Residential Development

The overall level of residential building permits for new construction issued in Leon County increased in 2012. However, for the second calendar year in a row, 2012 saw the fewest permits issued for new construction of single-family units (attached and detached) in a calendar year in Leon County since before 1970 (earliest Planning Department records available). Multi-family new construction permits were up in 2012 with six larger apartment communities permitted (601 South Copeland, Capital Place at Southwood, Catalyst, Collegetown, Luxe on West Call and the U Club on Woodward).

## 6.3 Commercial Development



### 6.4 Urban Service Area Development


The principal growth management strategy of the Tallahassee-Leon County Comprehensive Plan is the Urban Service Area (USA). The location and size of the USA is based upon the area necessary to accommodate 90% of new residential dwelling units within the County by the Plan Horizon. The percentage of new residential development constructed within the approximate 161 square mile USA in 2012 was 93.5%.

## 6.5 Office Market Summary

The total Tallahassee/Leon County office market consists of approximately seven million square feet of privately owned office space. In addition, the State of Florida owns and occupies approximately 4.5 million square feet. The overall office vacancy rate in Leon County decreased as of year-end 2012 to 20.0% (from 20.9% for year-end 2011).



### 6.6 Apartment Market Summary

The apartment vacancy rate in Tallahassee increased from 8.1% in September 2011 to 9.4% in September 2012. The average monthly rent is over \$950 with the average one bedroom renting for just over \$650 per month and the average four bedroom renting for just under \$1,900 per month.

#### 6.7 Median Residential Sale Prices

The median sales price of a detached single-family home in Leon County decreased 1.3% per quarter on average between first quarter 2008 and fourth quarter 2012. Over the past eleven years, (first quarter 2001 to first quarter 2012) the median sales price increased on average 0.6% per quarter.

# **6.8 Mortgage Foreclosure Cases**


